Florida's Operator Certification Program



CEU Plan spoke with Ron McCulley, Florida Department of Environmental Protection's (FDEP) Program Administrator about their <u>Operator Certification Program</u>.

Ron first became affiliated with the OCP when the program was still under the control of the Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation in 1993. He coordinated the examination scheduling, grade mailings and post-examination reviews for OCP until the program was transferred back to FDEP in 1997. Then, in 2004, Ron rejoined the OCP and later became the Administrator of the program in 2009. During his tenure as Administrator, Ron has worked hard at keeping the needs of the operator at the forefront of the program's initiatives.


Making the Licensing Process Easier and Faster for Operators

Florida's certification program has improved by leaps and bounds over the last 7 years, evolving from a paper-based to a computer-based testing system. Not only are Florida's licensure examinations able to be administered at ten local locations, but Florida exams can now be administered anywhere in the nation. Furthermore, candidates now schedule their examination on a date and time convenient to them (Monday-Saturday), with results available immediately upon completion. Previously, the paper-based exams were given only twice per year at six locations and results took weeks to arrive in the mail. Since the inception of computer-based testing, the program has maintained a satisfaction rate of over 99%.

Online license renewal is another streamlined process implemented by the OCP. This capability was met with great success with approximately 50% of all licenses now being renewed via the web. The OCP is also proud of its ability to print and mail licenses within 24 hours of renewal versus the 4-5 weeks of processing required previously. And for those operators who have employers that renew their licenses, their renewal form can also be found online for the operator to print and give to their employer.



The newest initiative launched by the program is the ability for operators to now apply for their re-examination online. Ron said that "Our applicants can now apply for their re-exam online and receive an instant re-approval. Retake applicants can view their most recent exam history and course expiration dates online. Following their re-approval, an email is sent containing the approval letter and a receipt that can be given to employers for reimbursement purposes. This will save our applicants about 4 weeks of waiting time that is typically associated with the standard paper process."



In addition to the modernization of the program, another one of Ron's goals was to increase the amount of training that is available to new applicants and existing operators. Since 2007, Ron has worked closely with training providers and the number of approved water and wastewater training courses has tripled from 21 to 63 courses for operators to choose from.

Also, all of the Operator Certification Handbooks, rules and statutes, and important publications are on the website. There is also a link to Frequently Asked Questions, a license search, and a new "Hours Calculator" for operators to determine if required time of on-the-job experience has been met.

Challenges for Florida's OCP

One challenge FDEP has already met was the new state requirement for licensing distribution system operators. While the license requirement did not take effect until May 2011, FDEP started the process of adding the new examinations in 2007. A total of 3,893 distribution operators have been licensed through the program.

Although budgets are always tight, and funding limits some of the endeavors the staff would like to pursue, Ron is proud of the fact that FDEP's Operator Certification Program is 100% self-sustaining. Exam, license and renewal fees cover all costs to administer and operate the program and have remained unchanged since they were reduced in 2001. Ron has said that he will continue to work at keeping operating costs low and he sees no need to look for any fee increases.

Customer Friendly

The key objective for Florida's Operator Certification Program is to provide as much personal assistance to its operators as possible. Ron and his staff are always ready and willing to take the time to listen to operators and try to work through issues.

What the Future Holds

Future plans for FDEP's program include continuing to get as much information and certification activity online at the operators' fingertips as possible.

The Florida OCP is a great example of a successful operator certification program.
